In response to your request, Department staff have visited this site and reviewed the proposed subdivision plans. Based upon our review, it appears that the Department jurisdiction is as follows:


Department Jurisdiction

Article 15, Protection of Waters: The nearby stream, Otter Creek, NYS Waters Index # LIS-10, is a Class C stream. No permits are required.

Article 25, Tidal Wetlands and Article 24, Freshwater Wetlands: This parcel contains bother freshwater wetland J-2, Class 2 and tidal wetland categorized as high marsh. The locations of these wetlands and their respective adjacent areas have been field-verified by Department staff. The entire wetland on the property meets the requirements for regulation under Article 24 with the associated 100-foot adjacent area. The tidal portion of the wetland, which extended slightly north of the proposed lot 1 and 2 boundary, has an adjacent area which extends only to the 10-foot elevation line per 6 NYCRR Part 661.4(b)(1)(iii). Staff have verified that this area does not meet the criteria required for extension of jurisdiction above the 10-foot contour – presence of a "bluff or cliff, or ... a hill on which the slope equals or exceeds the natural angle of repose of the soil".

The clearing/grading shown on the plan (dated October 14, 2009 and revised November 24, 2009) is in close proximity (~2-3 feet) to the freshwater wetland adjacent area. It is unlikely this work can be undertaken without disturbing this adjacent area. A reasonable separation to ensure no disturbance is necessary prior to the Department making a determination that a permit not required for freshwater wetlands.

No disturbance within or near the tidal wetland adjacent area is show on the plan. However regardless of proposed areas of disturbance, subdivision of a parcel containing tidal wetland and/or adjacent area requires a permit. It does not appear that this action requires any variances

from restrictions, as described in 6 NYCRR Part 661.6. This is a minor action under Uniform Procedures and therefore the \$200.00 application fee will apply.

Compliance with the State Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (SPDES) General Permit for Stormwater Discharges from Construction Activities (GP-0-08-001): For proposed disturbance of 1 acre or more of land outside the NYC DEP Watershed. This site is within an MS4 area (Municipal Separate Storm Sewer System), so the SWPPP must be reviewed and accepted by the municipality and the MS-4 Acceptance Form must be submitted to the Department. Authorization for coverage under the SPDES General Permit is not granted until the Department issues any other necessary DEC permits.

Other: This site is within the NYS Department of State Coastal Management Area. A Coastal Consistency determination is required. See the DOS Division of Coastal Resources website for additional information - http://nyswaterfronts.com/consistency.asp

Cultural Resources: This site is within an area identified by NYS as having the potential for archeological resources. An archeological resources assessment and the review by the New York State Office of Parks, Recreation and Historic Preservation is required.

The Department of Environmental Conservation (DEC) has reviewed your letter dated September 7, 2010 regarding this proposed subdivision of lands regulated under Article 24 of the Environmental Conservation Law, Freshwater Wetlands and Article 25, Tidal Wetlands. You have requested clarification of how DEC made the determination that the site does not meet the criteria for extension of the tidal wetlands adjacent area jurisdiction above the 10-foot contour line.



Please note, your letter and accompanying map make reference to 75 feet and a "75 foot offset". There is no such offset in the definition of adjacent area. There is a 75-foot minimum setback in the "Development restrictions" section, but this is unrelated to the definition of adjacent area.

Regarding the definition of tidal wetland adjacent area, per 6 NYCRR Part 661.4(b) the adjacent area extends landward of the tidal wetland boundary within the following limits:

- 300 feet landward of the boundary or
- to the seaward edge of an existing (as of August 20, 1977) functional barrier (i.e. street, seawall, bulkhead)
- to the elevation contour of 10 feet above mean sea level (per NAVD88) except "where such contour crosses the seaward face of a bluff or cliff" (emphasis added)

While it is true that there are areas where steep slopes exist which could be considered bluffs or cliffs, those areas occur above the 10-foot contour and are not **erossed** by it. See below.

Your letter and map suggest that the 10-foot contour crosses the slope of the retaining wall associated with the existing house, however the applicant's plans show the existing retaining wall beginning just above the 11-foot contour. Even if the 10-foot contour did cross the wall, the adjacent area would only extend to the top of the wall and would not affect any determinations on the proposed development.

The Department is still awaiting a State Environmental Quality Review (SEQR) determination from the Village of Mamaroneck and has not yet received an application from the Alters. If you have any questions, please contact me at (845) 256-3014 or the above address.

The database that we use to respond to list requests was developed primarily to assist Federal agencies that are consulting with us under Section 7(a)(2) of the Endangered Species Act (ESA) (87 Stat. 884, as amended; 16 U.S.C. 1531 et seq.). Our lists include all Federally-listed, proposed, and candidate species known to occur, as well as those likely to occur, in specific counties.

The attached information is designed to assist project sponsors or applicants through the process of determining whether a Federally-listed, proposed, or candidate species and/or "critical habitat" may occur within their proposed project area and when it is appropriate to contact our offices for additional coordination or consultation. You may be aware that our offices have provided much of this information in the past in project-specific letters. However, due to increasing project review workloads and decreasing staff, we are now providing as much information as possible through our website. We encourage anyone requesting species list information to print out all materials used in any analyses of effects on listed, proposed, or candidate species.

The Service routinely updates this database as species are proposed, listed, and delisted, or as we obtain new biological information or specific presence/absence information for listed species. If project proponents coordinate with the Service to address proposed and candidate species in early stages of planning, this should not be a problem if these species are eventually listed. However, we recommend that both project proponents and reviewing agencies retrieve from our online database an updated list every 90 days to append to this document to ensure that listed species presence/absence information for the proposed project is *current*.

Reminder: Section 9 of the ESA prohibits unauthorized taking** of listed species and applies to Federal and non-Federal activities. For projects not authorized, funded, or carried out by a Federal agency, consultation with the Service pursuant to Section 7(a)(2) of the ESA is not required. However, no person is authorized to "take**" any listed species without appropriate authorizations from the Service. Therefore, we provide technical assistance to individuals and agencies to assist with project planning to avoid the potential for "take**," or when appropriate, to provide assistance with their application for an incidental take permit pursuant to Section 10(a)(1)(B) of the ESA.

Additionally, endangered species and their habitats are protected by Section 7(a)(2) of the ESA, which requires Federal agencies, in consultation with the Service, to ensure that any action it authorizes, funds, or carries out is not likely to jeopardize the continued existence of listed species or result in the destruction or adverse modification of critical habitat. An assessment of the potential direct, indirect, and cumulative impacts is required for all Federal actions that may affect listed species.

For instance, work in certain waters of the United States, including wetlands and streams, may require a permit from the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers (Corps). If a permit is required, in reviewing the application pursuant to the Fish and Wildlife Coordination Act (48 Stat. 401, as amended;16 U.S.C. 661 et seq.), the Service may concur, with or without recommending additional permit conditions, or recommend denial of the permit depending upon potential adverse impacts on fish and wildlife resources associated with project construction or implementation. The need for a Corps permit may be determined by contacting the appropriate Corps office(s).*

For additional information on fish and wildlife resources or State-listed species, we suggest contacting the appropriate New York State Department of Environmental Conservation regional office(s) and the New York Natural Heritage Program Information Services.*

Since wetlands, ponds, streams, or open or sheltered coastal waters may be present in the project area, it may be helpful to utilize the National Wetlands Inventory (NWI) maps as an initial screening tool. However, they may or may not be available for the project area. Please note that while the NWI maps are reasonably accurate, they should not be used in lieu of field surveys for determining the presence of wetlands or delineating wetland boundaries for Federal regulatory purposes. Online information on the NWI program and digital data can be downloaded from Wetlands Mapper, http://wetlands.fws.gov/mapper_tool.htm.

Project construction or implementation should not commence until all requirements of the ESA have been fulfilled. After reviewing our website and following the steps outlined, we encourage both project proponents and reviewing agencies to contact our office to determine whether an accurate determination of species impacts has been made. If there are any questions about our county lists or agency or project proponent responsibilities under the ESA, please contact the New York or Long Island Field Office Endangered Species Program at the numbers listed above.

- ** Under the Act and regulations, it is illegal for any person subject to the jurisdiction of the United States to *take* (includes harass, harm, pursue, hunt, shoot, wound, kill, trap, capture, or collect; or to attempt any of these), import or export, ship in interstate or foreign commerce in the course of commercial activity, or sell or offer for sale in interstate or foreign commerce any endangered fish or wildlife species and most threatened fish and wildlife species. It is also illegal to possess, sell, deliver, carry, transport, or ship any such wildlife that has been taken illegally. "Harm" includes any act which actually kills or injures fish or wildlife, and case law has clarified that such acts may include significant habitat modification or degradation that significantly impairs essential behavioral patterns of fish or wildlife.
