## To Whom It May Concern:

VHB Engineering, Surveying and Landscape Architecture, P.C. (VHB) is serving as environmental and engineering consultant to Hampshire Recreation, LLC, which is submitting a proposal for Planning Board approval of a Planned Residential Subdivision and associated development of 44 one-family homes and 61 two- and three-family semi-detached townhomes (the "Proposed Project") on the current Hampshire Country Club property within the Village of Mamaroneck. The Proposed Project would also include construction of eight tennis courts and preservation of approximately 72 acres of shared open space. The Village of Mamaroneck Planning Board is acting as Lead Agency for the SEQR review.

The project site (the "Site") is located at 1025 Cove Road and consists of approximately 106.2 acres (**See Exhibit 1**). The Site currently operates as an 18-hole golf course with associated tennis courts, a swimming pool, and clubhouse facilities. The existing Hampshire Country Club clubhouse and associated recreational facilities would remain in use under the Proposed Project. A portion of the Site borders the Long Island Sound. A small 7.3-acre portion of the Site is located within the Town of Mamaroneck, however, no development is proposed for that portion.

VHB has prepared a Full Environmental Assessment Form (FEAF) for the Proposed Project for the Village of Mamaroneck. We are writing to inquire whether there are any NYNHP records of rare/protected plants, wildlife and/or natural communities on, or proximate to, the Project Site.

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

In response to your recent request, we have reviewed the New York Natural Heritage Program database with respect to the above project.

We have no records of rare or state-listed animals or plants, or significant natural communities at your site or in its immediate vicinity.

The absence of data does not necessarily mean that rare or state-listed species, significant natural communities, or other significant habitats do not exist on or adjacent to the proposed site. Rather, our files currently do not contain information that indicates their presence. For most sites, comprehensive field surveys have not been conducted. We cannot provide a definitive statement on the presence or absence of all rare or state-listed species or significant natural communities. Depending on the nature of the project and the conditions at the project site, further information from on-site surveys or other resources may be required to fully assess impacts on biological resources.

This response applies only to known occurrences of rare or state-listed animals and plants, significant natural communities, and other significant habitats maintained in the Natural Heritage database.
