The Village has been subjected to EPA Administrative Order CWA-02-2011-3022 with regard to high levels of bacteria detected in the Mamaroneck and Sheldrake Rivers in the Village of Mamaroneck. To address and implement IDDE Measures, the Village has retained the services of Arcadis Engineers to perform IDDE testing, investigation and sampling upstream, and up-system. Multiple issues were identified and addressed. 140 Sanitary sewer compliance certificates issued.

B. Briefly summarize the observations that indicated the overall effectiveness of this Measurable Goal.

The Village has awarded a contract to a consultant for illicit discharge detection and elimination. Analytical sampling has been completed at outfalls with dry weather flow and within drainage basins to isolate sources. Based on the results of 2013 analyses testing sources were identified and then corrective action taken. The Village targeted the Orienta neighborhood in 2014. Approximately 370 requests to conduct home inspections were mailed. Approx. 170 homeowners consented.

On MCM 1 page 4 of 4, please refer to item F, where it says:

Briefly summarize the stormwater activities planned to meet the goals of this MCM during the next reporting cycle (including an implementation schedule).

The very first item in the response box says, "Continue to make questionnaire available".

It is my understanding that in 2012, the village produced a questionnaire. I also understand that as far as anyone I have spoken to knows, there is no record of anyone ever responding to this questionnaire. I have never seen it, and I don't know of anyone who has.

I think that given the regularity with which the community receives email blasts and notifications from the Village Manager, this would be an excellent method of circulating the questionnaire.

My suggestion is this be done more than once, and possibly on a regular basis to insure that enough residents see it, read it and respond to it. I also think that a friendly introduction would be helpful, so those residents who may not be familiar with the terminology are not intimidated, and made to understand that their input is valuable and necessary.

Response:

The Village can incorporate this suggestion into our program.

Water Quality Trends Page 1 of 1 #1 - Indicates that the Village has produced "reports documenting water quality trends related to stormwater" and gives a web address of an "index". I went to the address but could not find any reports documenting trends. Please let me know which item in the index you are referencing.

The EPA Compliance & Save the Sound link on the Village's Stormwater page provide links to various reports.

MCM 1 Page 2 of 4 #3 - Indicates that the Village has had 200 "Public events/Presentations". Is that # correct?

The reference is to the # of attendees at the events not the number of events total.

MCM 1 Page 4 of 4 #4A - States "Questionnaire available for residents and businesses to comment on program." It is my understanding that in the three years since the village created the questionnaire there is no record of any resident or business filling out the survey. For a questionnaire to be effective there need to be responses. I hope the Village will consider finding a way of dessiminating the questionnaire to residents and businesses to generate responses.

As noted in the response to Ms. Stabile, the Village will attempt to use various methods to inform the public of the survey.

MCM 2 Page 1 of 6 - the Village has checked off "Comments on SWMP Received" but does not indicate the number of comments.

This will be corrected for the final draft to be submitted to the State of New York.

MCM 2 Page 5 of 6 - Questions 4,5 and 6 are incorrectly answered and should not be answered until the public meeting has taken place.

This refers to the 2014 Annual Report, not the 2015 Draft report.

MCM 2 Page 6 of 6 #7 - What record do you consider the Village's Stormwater Management Program Plan (SWMPP)?

The Village's Stormwater Management Plan

MCM 3 Page 2 of 4 #3b - The report indicates that no illicit discharges were found. Wasn't the Village given a Violation for a Sanitary Sewer Overflow and the Sportime Pollutant Discharge in this reporting year?

The release of discharge at the Tennis Bubbles is considered a solid state discharge and not considered an illicit discharge per the MS-4 guidelines.

MCM 3 Page 2 of 4 #5 - How can one illicit discharge have been confirmed if there are none reported?

Question #4 indicates that one (1) illicit discharge/illegal connection was detected so the answer is consistent. This will be updated based on sanitary sewer overflows.

MCM 3 Page 4 of 4 #12A -The "EPA Administrative Order CWA-02-2011-3022" cited was issued to the Village in 2011, not this reporting year. I believe those orders mentioned above should be listed for this reporting year.

This is addressed in the answer to question 12B & 12C. Unfortunately, limits the amount of text that is visible in the answer field so for the purpose of brevity,

MCM 4/5 Page 2 of 2 #6 - Can it be correct that the Village took NO enforcement actions in the reporting year?

Based on records reviewed, a number of inspections were conducted, but no official enforcement actions were initiated.

MCM 5 Page 3 of 3 #6F - The report states that the Village will "Continue to identify pre-existing BMP's, inventory and determine inspection/maintenance needs of same." It is my understanding that the Village does not and has never inventoried BMP. Is that incorrect? If not I believe "continue" should be changed to "will begin"

The Village initiated this process in 2014, however, with staff turnover in the building and engineering departments, it was stalled.

MCM 6 Page 2 of 3 #2 - The report indicates that the village is no longer using nitrogen to fertilize anything in the Village. Is that correct?

Yes. This was confirmed with the General Foreman of the Parks Department

MCM 2 Page 6 of 6 #3-6 - How can the village have 100% of employees trained if there has not been training for 5 years? Have their been no new hires since then?

A training session was held in April of 2015, however, since it occurred after the reporting year, it is not included in the report.

Celia Felsher

• In answer to Question 3 ("How many stormwater management trainings have been provided to municipal employees during this reporting period?") and Question 5 ("How many municipal employees have been trained in the reporting period"), the Village has answered "0".

As it relates to training, this refers to minimum control measure #6 – Pollution Prevention & Good Housekeeping. This minimum measure is intended to encourage municipalities to lead by example in its environmental efforts. The question deals more with the training of public works and park staff in terms of how to maintain Village facilities.

The MS-4 Report covers activities that occurred during the reporting year which covers March 10, 2014 – March 9, 2015. We did send municipal staff to training in April of this year, however, because of the reporting year timeframe, the question is answered in that manner. A problem I have with the reporting form is that it is a bit didactic in its form and does not always allow for the provision of supplemental information.

Given the significant issues we face with flooding and stormwater runoff, how is it possible that the Village has not conducted any training during the reporting period and, in fact, last conducted training almost **five years ago** (See the answer to Question 4)? I would very much appreciate that this be addressed directly. How can we even have a sliver of hope that our stormwater laws are being enforced and stormwater management is being conducted appropriately if we don't have any training sessions? Who is responsible for this?

Your comment above is more directly addressed through minimum control measure 4 -- Construction Site runoff Control and minimum control measure 5 - Post-Construction Site runoff control. This question does not address training of other members of the professional staff (e.g. Building Inspectors, Code Enforcement Officers, Engineers, etc.). When opportunities for training are made available, we encourage our professional staff to attend. For instance, the Building Inspector attended a Floodplain Management Conference in April and other opportunities are available throughout the year whether they be sponsored by the New York State Department of Environmental Conservation, the New York State Building Officials Conference, New York State Department of State, or other organizations/associations.

• If there have been no training sessions in almost five years, how is it possible that 100% of municipal employees "in relevant positions and departments" receive management training (See the answer to Question 6)? Have there been no relevant position hires in the last five years?

As it relates to minimum control measure #6 – Pollution Prevention & Good Housekeeping and the employees "in relevant positions and departments" which I would consider to be Public Works (including Highway, Sewers, Central Garage, Sanitation) and Parks is unchanged since 2010. However, as noted we did conduct training in April of this year and I would like to see more frequent training in the future.

4.A. "Questionnaire available" Reference to this Questionnaire should be eliminated. It was an idea that Sarah Evans and I worked on with you that was never rolled out. Posting it on the Village Website with no publicity and then receiving no responses is an embarrassment.

We will use additional measures to publicize the availability of the questionnaire.

Also 4.A. Reference to "Green Infrastructure seminar October 2014" What was this seminar? I mentioned including of December 3 Public Presentation Meeting with Save the Sound. This was a significant event involving the Village Manager. I urge you to include reference. Again in MCM 2 Page 6of6 Public Involvement – It would be good to mention the December 3 Public Meeting attended by about 40 citizens. Save The Sound made several recommendations for BOT action program and followed up with written Recommendations now under consideration.

The report will be updated to reflect this meeting.

MCM 3 Page 20f4: Count of illicit discharges for the annual period "1". I don't the formal definition of an illicit discharge but I think of the red clay discharge into the East Basin, the April 2014 overflowing sanitary sewers and others. How can this be "1"?

Based on our review with our engineers, the issue with the tennis courts it is a release of total suspended solids and not an illicit discharge as defined by the MS-4 Program. The SSO's were inadvertently left off the report. It will be updated accordingly.

MCM 3 Page 4of4: There is no mention of Village responses to the DEC Consent Order and fine of October 2014 for storm water flow causing sanitary sewer overflows. Also the is no mention of the red clay plume from the Sports Time/ Village tennis courts. The DEC knows about these. How can they be omitted?

Based on our review with our engineers, the issue with the tennis courts it is a release of total suspended solids and not an illicit discharge as defined by the MS-4 Program.

MCM 6 Page 2of3: Question 2 - Chemical Fertilizer – You answer "0" to all three questions. This would mean that the Village uses no fertilizer on any of its fields or parks. Is this correct?

Yes. Confirmed with the General Foreman of the Parks Department.

MCM 6 Page 2of3: Questions 3,4,5,6 About stormwater management for Village employees – the answers say that all (100%) of the employees have been trained. However the last training session is give as 2010. No turnover? How is this possible?

As noted in the response to Ms. Felcher, this minimum measure is intended to encourage municipalities to lead by example in its environmental efforts. The question deals more with the training of public works and park staff in terms of how to maintain Village facilities.

The MS-4 Report covers activities that occurred during the reporting year which covers March 10, 2014 – March 9, 2015. We did send municipal staff to training in April of this year, however, because of the reporting year timeframe, the question is answered in that manner. A problem I have with the reporting form is that it is a bit didactic in its form and does not always allow for the provision of supplemental information.

MCM 6 Page 3of3: Question 7F: Concerning Storm Catch Basins cleaning, the CFTE suggests that you add reference the curbside leaves pick plan for Washingtonville. We also recommend further consideration of leaf bagging and streetsweeping in December to reduce leaves in the storm sewers.

The report will be updated to include information on the leaf bagging initiative. As it relates to street sweeping. The Village can note that it attempts to provide street sweeping during the winter months as weather conditions allow.

First, the report asks for an assessment of the Village's progress (trends) towards its MS-4 goals. So, I tried to identify those goals. On the website, I checked out each of the links under the tab named "Stormwater Management." I wanted to alert you to the fact that five of the links are apparently blank—namely Minimum Control Measures 2-6. There are two Stormwater Management Plans —one is the Phase II Stormwater Plan of 2003 and the other is called the Village Stormwater Management Plan of 2012.

Can you please confirm the base plan that we are measuring progress against? Without having measurable goals, I am deeply puzzled about our measures of progress in this annual report. One cannot measure trends without some sense of an objective. It would be very helpful if the Village would explicitly outline its f management objectives and measurements that will help mark progress in our MS-4 responsibilities.

For example, if we have 100,000 linear feet of Village sewer line with an average age of ____ years, then it would be nice to report that we have re-lined a cumulative ____ linear feet since 200x resulting in an average age of ____. I hope this hypothetical example helps illustrate that we should have measurable goals of reducing the average age of our sewer infrastructure, rather than reporting how many linear feet had been relined in any given year. The problem with the latter measure is that it does not inform the public as to whether the problem is getting worse of better. It would also be helpful to understand the desired average age of our sewer infrastructure. What we are aiming for? Do we want the average age to be 20 years so that we can upgrade 5 percent every year? Do we want to reline 10 percent in the next 5 years to catch-up with problems of aging and then move to reline every 5 years? We need a goal and a way to measure progress. It would be helpful to me to see graphic representation of the plan and the actual performance trends. This whole process suffers from a lack of rigor on the part of the Village.

The Village's Stormwater Management Plan covers many of these issues, as it relates to the storm sewer system. External factors at the County, State and federal levels are requiring the Village to re-assess its capabilities and priorities for maintenance activities..

Second, I wanted to ask about the number and types of illegal discharges this period. That information is not reported. I personally have reported instances of sanitary sewer overflows along Rushmore Avenue so I am concerned that this data is not being summarized and analyzed.

This was inadvertently left off the report. There were six that were accounted for and this will be in the final report.

Third, I think we need a plan to map septic systems to help bring those facilities up to standard if they are aged and improperly sized.

We have information from Westchester County on the total # of septic systems and it has been mapped. We will send out notices in the current reporting year apprising these property owners of their responsibilities

Fourth, I am truly troubled that we have taken no enforcement action —even issuing not a single notice of violation—for failure to comply with requirements for construction activity. Even an untrained individual such as myself, can be troubled by construction sites unsecured with effective erosion and sediment controls. Can't we train the scores of Village personnel who are on the streets daily to be alert to these problems? Until the Village makes clear that it cares about developers allowing runoff into our waterways, we have no hope of solving this problem.

We are constantly working to enhance our enforcement efforts and while there were apparently no violations issued in the reporting year, inspections are conducted. We will work harder in the current year to evaluate current enforcement protocols to determine their effectiveness and how they can be improved.
