Dear Chairs and members of the Tree Committee,

I am writing to comment on the agenda for your meeting Thursday night and general tree issues.

Beginning at the top:

Approval of November Minutes -

There are no minutes on the agenda for review and approval as required by Open Meetings Law.

Comments from Residents -

Its my opinion, especially for residents who are concerned about the Village Tree programs, a three minute limitation on comments is counterproductive to the TC work.

Correspondence -

I hope there will be some discussion of the substantive comments made in writing about the Village's tree programs

Tree Maintenance - 404 and 407 Creek

There are a hundred other trees in the Village that need to be pruned more than the trees on Creek, especially considering that the newly planted tree on adjacent to 404 on the Parkway has been recently topped.

Trees for Evaluation and/or Removal - 322 South Barry Avenue

First, why would the Village Manager send this complaint to the TC. Clearly, with the trees on Guion Drive and HIP, when other residents want trees taken down, they just get taken down.

Second, based on GIS maps there are no trees on Village property adjacent to 322 S. Barry and the tree on their neighbor's property is not the Village's problem. The Manager's office should have been able to tell them that.

Violations

According to GIS mapping there is no 540 W. Post Road. You probably mean 532 W. Post Road, the address about which I sent the TC a complaint about fourteen months ago. Since then I have sent complaints about another half dozen topped trees in the Village.

You can keep endlessly keep asking whether violations have been issued or you can start asking "why" there is never any consequence to residents topping, even when they do it year after year, like the trees on Barry Avenue.

Fall Planting

I wrote the TC about the state of the Fall Planting. It is December, technically the contract expired at the end of November and we are about to have a foot of snow. The Village Manager is free to tell you whatever he wants but I would suggest you ask him for evidence that last year's vendor is going to honor last years contract and when that may happen.

Two trees were planted on Halstead just to the west of Florence. I believe they are the two Redbuds moved from Guion Drive for some unexplained reason. Neither of these locations appear on the Fall 2020 tree planting schedule that I received from the Village.

Both trees are planted in violation of Village tree planting guidelines and Chapter 318 of Village Code. The tree closest to Fourth St. violates the setback distance from street corners, the distance between the two trees violates the separation guidelines approved by the BOT.

Again, it makes no sense to pass laws and guidelines if they are just going to be ignored.

Tree Inventory Updates

Let me guess, there are none.

I believe it is a fantasy to think that anywhere in the foreseeable future that the Village will appropriate funds for a tree inventory. I have sent you information about crowd-sourcing tree inventories. I hope the TC will discuss it at some point.

Pruning Larger Elms

It is not the half dozen mature elms that need pruning, it is the 100+ newly planted elms that need pruning desperately.

Please stop discussing structural soil for sidewalk repairs, it makes no sense.

The Village already has regulations for the distances from corners and by extension stop signs. Please stop discussing and start following them when tree planting locations are selected, ie Halstead Avenue above.

TC members have no doubt gotten the notice that the Village, after January 1, will not be able to provide staff support for meetings other than land use boards. If you don't know, the BOT had secret discussions at Monday's work session about a hiring freeze and furloughs of existing employees. Extremely challenging economic are hurtling toward every local community. All budgets should be and likely will be cut significantly, including funds for maintaining and planting trees.

According to Village Code, the TC has only one mandated responsibility - "It shall be the responsibility of the Tree Committee to study, investigate, develop and/or update annually and administer a written plan for the care, preservation, pruning, planting, replanting, removal or disposition of trees and shrubs in parks, along streets and in other public areas, with an estimate of the costs in hours to be worked by village employees and the cost of nursery stock to be used. Such plan shall be presented annually to the Village Board."

As far as I know the TC has never performed this required task. Budget season will begin within a couple of months. I hope the TC will consider presenting your recommendations for a budget to the Board of Trustees early in the process.

Jerry,

My issues are not with adding trees to the property, per se. The problems that I see go back to my original statement that the planning and design of the tree placement was poorly conceived and executed without any consideration to the residents that are directly affected.

- Placement of the trees has destroyed the ability to use the parcel, in direct conflict with your statement below.
- The trees are placed without any regard to power and/or utility lines that directly feed my home and the rest of the homes on the circle. Given the very, very poor track record of the village maintaining this parcel of land properly over the years already, I fail to see how the village can possibly prevent the new trees from becoming a significant threat to these lines going forward. The Village code (section 318-10) clearly allows the tree committee to adjust standards for the distance trees should be planted away from streets, fireplugs, etc and it would appear that no regard was given to the utility lines. While you say that no tree was planted on the yard of a Guion Drive resident, the trees within the circle directly affect all the residents.
- If additional older trees are to be removed, why was that part of the project not completed first? Placing the new trees in an area where previous trees were located (assuming that you properly remove the root system) is a much more viable option than planting new trees in areas that create other issues. The Village has already shown that the tree that was previously removed in the circle has done nothing but destroy the land by not removing the roots properly and an inability to properly even get grass to grow.
- Simply adding a few trees to this parcel of village property is purely cosmetic, does nothing to address the real issues with, and is quite frankly a waste of money

- The improper drainage (well, actually complete lack of drainage) should be addressed before any planting if you want the trees to survive. This is part of the problem of why trees have died their previously
- There is absolutely no curbing around the circle and village trucks are consistently driving on the grass area, tearing up the land.
- The street itself has not been paved in decades and is a complete disaster - which is contributing to the improper drainage and creating run-off that directly affects the surrounding properties.

It is pretty clear to me that the tree planting in this area was not very well thought out and, even if a resident asked for trees to be added, there was no regard for the overall effect to the other residents of the circle. I have personally had dealings with the village Planning Board and Harbor & Coastal Zone Management Committee and I am keenly aware of the rules posting signage for projects, collecting feedback, etc all of which seem to not apply in this case for some reason which is just baffling to me. There is a lot more work that needs to be done to this parcel of land, and certainly other projects in the village where money could be better spent, before wasting money simply planting a few trees that are going to die or have to be removed in a couple of years because the village cannot properly maintain.

Dear Chairs and Members of Tree Committee,

I am again writing about the wholesale loss of mature, healthy Village trees without review for reasonableness or control of costs.

Please see attached the latest invoice from Almstead Tree with a line for \$6,252 to remove six trees from Warren Avenue Park and notification that there is no Purchase Order. At least four of four of removed trees appear to have been healthy. Below is an image of the stump of the 48" tree, there is nothing I could see to indicate the tree was unhealthy. Three other stumps I looked at were similarly sound.

Beyond losing four, what about the cost?

Committee members have likely received the Village Manager's email notifying you that he will no longer be using staff to support non land use board meetings because of "careful budget management".

In my opinion, careful budget management would also include knowing how much you are paying to remove trees BEFORE they are removed and consideration of whether there is good reason to spend the money. Both those management practices appear to currently be missing in the Village's process for the removal of trees.

Six thousand dollars would pay to support a lot of TC meetings.
